The Reason for the Season

Advent 2022 is now officially here. Thanksgiving has passed, and just how quickly that happened still confounds me. Christmas is 4 weeks away. We are now all racing like the wind to get the baking done. To get Christmas decorations up both inside and outside the house. To get all our Christmas present shopping done, don't forget the time needed to wrap and even the extra time needed to mail all those things to family and friends. I am particularly jealous of those who have mailed out their Christmas and Season greeting cards to everyone. That project is tough for me to get done, but then I tend to procrastinate until there is no time left (just ask my taxman).

This is the first real Advent we will experience since the pandemic which, in my opinion, creates an additional rush. It also creates a very special opportunity for our OAKDALE Methodist family. Advent is a time of joyful anticipation. We await the coming of Jesus Christ as a tiny baby resting in a manger in swaddling clothes. In a very short time, the day we celebrate the birth of the Christ child will have come and gone. We will continue our headlong rush into Epiphany and then Ash Wednesday, Lent, Easter, Pentecost, and Ordinary times and POOF! The year has once again passed us by.

So here is my suggestion. Let's take this Advent one minute at a time, one hour at a time, one day at a time, one week at a time. The year-round commitment can continue in the form of a check-up during Lent. The time of reflection will provide the ability to review our commitments and through Easter Re-double our efforts. By Pentecost and into Ordinary times we put our shoulders into the commitment of gifts we give to Jesus. Come, Christ, the King Sunday, 2023, we have all, together, as the Oakdale Community United Methodist Church not only conquered the pandemic but brought Christ into the real focus of our lives.

WHY A CHURCH COVENANT?

Greetings to you all. I have been preaching and talking a lot about a call to covenant together for our church. A covenant is **a two-way promise**, **the conditions of which are set by God**. When we enter into a covenant with God, we promise to keep those conditions. God promises us certain blessings in return. It is a two-way promise.

All of us, as followers of Christ, have entered into a covenant, ultimately from God. God promises us salvation if we love God and love others as ourselves. Of course, we have also committed ourselves as the body of Christ to work together as a congregation. So far, so good?

The problem becomes the degree to which we are committed to loving others, and the degree to which the church is willing to serve the needs of our community. While our church has endured splits in the past, and undergone many demoralizing changes, we find ourselves to be in a time where we no longer work together for the betterment of our community, and our numbers have dwindled. The oldest generation of members is passing on.

Most of us have seen the further church decline that has taken place as a result of the pandemic. Whether we took it seriously or not, no one disagrees that it has exacted a toll on our faith community, which cannot be ignored.

Since new members don't generally show up at our front door, we are at a loss as to how to turn the tide. What worked in other decades doesn't seem to work anymore. Over two thousand years ago, John the Baptist knew what to do.

He popped up in the wilderness, outside of Jerusalem, far away from the Roman soldiers, and Herod. Looking like a rugged incarnation of Elijah, he preached about the One who was to come. The One to come was to bring a new covenant, where mercy and justice for the poor would be practiced by all the people.

He called the Jewish establishment, and the Jewish people to renew their dedication to loving others, and creating peaceful world, where the people and the underserved would be elevated. The keepers of the law were to break their hypocritical practices, and humble themselves.

It was not a movement to overhaul the government. As a matter of fact, it wasn't a political movement at all. Then, as now, is was a deeply spiritual movement of baptism and renewal, putting the followers of the Messiah into the position of changing the world, one person at a time. This is what became the church.

Now the fact is, we can reverse none of the unfortunate things that have already happened to our church. We can, though, rededicate ourselves as involved church members, daily seeking to reach our community. Only by deeply uniting in a true covenant with Christ, can we be strong enough and effective enough to rebuild this church in the Spirit of God's mercy and love, starting with our worshiping together regularly.

No one will join a church if, when they do visit, only 6 to 10 people can be found worshiping. We must be a dedicated, cooperative group, working together, using our skills and keeping our promises, in order to save our church. Lately, many of you have heard my call to covenant, and your covenant efforts are already growing our numbers, and our outreach. I see hope, and peace on the horizon, and I am very grateful.

You will all eventually be receiving a covenant to read and sign. We are the church. You are the church. We are the church together. I call you into covenant for this 2022 - 2023 year. We can only grow if we do this together. Every one of us. Please join with me. Most of you are already generous givers. Now, I ask you to give of yourselves, your time, your talents, skills and gifts.
